Happy New Year, Westchester!

December was a special month in our community. The Village of Westchester and the Westchester Police Department were able to spread some holiday cheer to families in need. Our Police Department once again participated in the Shop with a Cop program, and generous donations helped us expand our involvement in the Christmas in Proviso program. This year, our officers teamed up with the Hillside, Bellwood, and Maywood Police Departments to help more than a dozen children shop for gifts for their families. A big thank-you to all the donors and volunteers who made this possible—you truly helped make the season brighter.

On December 16, the Village Board voted to continue negotiations with two developers interested in purchasing the property at Mannheim and Roosevelt. One of the proposals includes a Culver's franchise on part of the site, and a second developer will be exploring potential tenants and reporting back to the Village. We're excited to see interest in this key location and will keep residents updated as things move forward.

Winter started off mild—but the weekend after Thanksgiving quickly reminded us what Midwest weather can do! We received the most snow we've seen in a few years. Public Works kindly asks that when snow is on the way, please follow posted snow-route parking rules and the two-inch snow-fall parking restrictions. Our crews work hard to

clear every street, and it's much easier and safer for everyone when vehicles are parked properly.

The Westchester Food Pantry will be hosting its annual Souper Bowl on Saturday, January 31, 2026, from 5–8 p.m. at the Westchester Park District, 10201 Bond Street. Sixteen restaurants are participating this year. You can enjoy music, raffles, silent auctions, desserts, and of course plenty of soup—all to support the Pantry's mission of providing healthy food assistance to neighbors in need.

Looking ahead to spring, we hope residents take advantage of services offered by SBC Waste. Our annual Spring Clean-Up is scheduled for April 25, 2026. This is a great opportunity to dispose of bulk items and larger amounts of trash. Please check the Village website for details on what can and cannot be collected. Items such as appliances, carpet, and construction or demolition debris will be picked up if placed at the curb by 6 a.m. on April 25.

Finally, please join me in welcoming two new police officers who joined the department in December: Officer Veronica Suarez and Officer Erick Rios. Both were informally sworn in and have already begun their training. Officer Suarez is a state-certified officer and has started field training, and Officer Rios will begin the police academy in January. We're glad to have them serving our community.

Fire Safety during Winter Storms

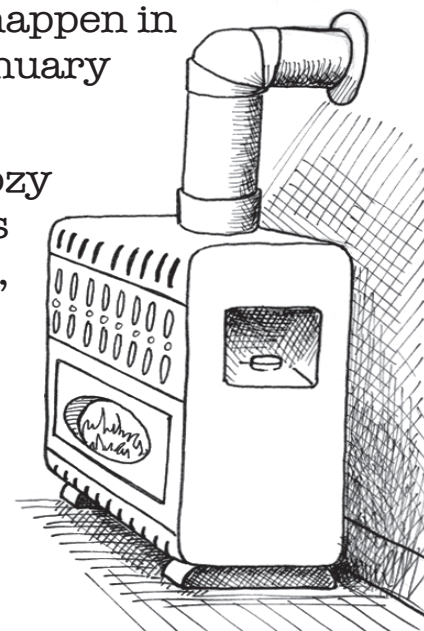

Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.

As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

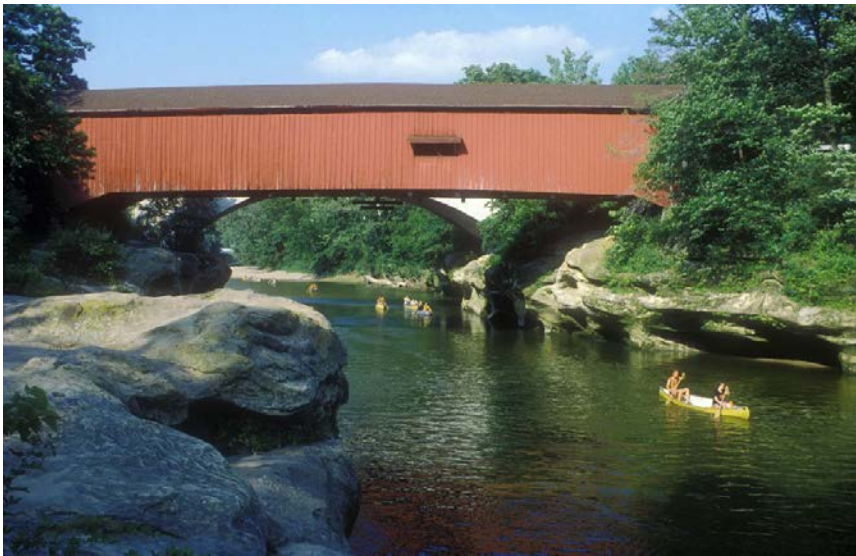

2026 Martin Luther King Jr. Day Holiday Garbage Schedule

There will be no change to the rubbish collection schedule the week of January 19, 2026.

Live Christmas trees will be collected on your regular rubbish day through January 16, 2026.

Yard waste collection will resume April 2, 2026.

Village branch collection will resume the week of April 6th - 10th

The Village Hall will be collecting non-working holiday lights for recycling until February 2nd

There are two recycle totes in the front of Village Hall for non-working holiday lights.

• If your garbage, recycling, and/or yard waste was at the curb by 6am but was not collected by 6pm on your regular day, please call S.B.C. directly to report a missed collection.

• You may place two (2) large items that will not fit in your receptacle (couch, chair, table, etc.) at the curb every week for collection.

Please call S.B.C. directly to inform them of large items.

• S.B.C. will collect household hazardous waste and electronic waste (e-waste), at no additional charge, including household chemicals, automotive products, paint products, garden chemicals, universal materials, batteries, long fluorescent lightbulbs, and swimming pool chemicals. This separate collection must be pre-scheduled by calling 312-522-1115.

Leaf Reminders As leaves fall, please remember **DO NOT** pile, blow, or rake your leaves into the street. This causes storm sewer problems which leads to flooding, and it is against Village Code. Yard waste is collected by S.B.C. through the end of December.

Village Snow Restrictions

Public Works crews keep our streets free of snow and ice during the winter months.

Please assist us by observing the following:

• Place garbage cans 3 feet behind the curb line- **do not place them in the street.**

• **Do not shovel or blow snow back into the cleared streets.**

• Please observe the “NO PARKING SNOW ROUTE” signs.

-The snow portion of the signs will be enforced after 2 inches of snowfall between December 1st and March 31st. If you reside on a Primary designated SNOW

ROUTE, after 2 inches of snowfall you must remove all vehicles from the snow route. Vehicles must stay off the street until the streets are cleared thoroughly by the plows by Public Works.

If the snowfall is continuing, the restriction is in place until Public Works completes the plowing for the day. Please check the signs at the corners of your block.

If you reside on a Secondary route, there is no parking Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday on the even numbered house side and no parking Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday on the odd numbered house side after 2 inches of snowfall. Please check the signs at the corners and center of your block for guidance. (This includes ALL side streets not designated a Primary snow route.)

If you have a Fire Hydrant on your parkway, please help keep the hydrant clear of snow so that the Fire Department may easily access the hydrant in case of an emergency, and so that the snow plows may quickly identify the hydrants while plowing.

Westchester Tree Replacement Program

1. The Village has been planting trees on eligible parkways at no cost to the resident. This replacement program does not allow for residents to choose the species of tree planted, the location, the number of trees planted, nor are residents able to opt-out of having a tree planted in the Village parkway in front and/or side of their residence. Please call Public Works if you would like to request a tree

be planted, sooner rather than later, on any parkway.

2. If you would prefer to choose the species of the tree to be planted, this can be achieved through the 50/50 program.

The resident may choose the tree(s) from a list provided by the Village, and shares half of the cost of the tree(s) and planting with the Village. To request the list of 50/50 trees, please call the Public Works Department at 708-345-0041.

As always, residents are asked to call Public Works at 708-345-0041 if an unusual amount of water is visible in the street or parkway. This could be a main break or water leak that requires our immediate attention.

If after 3:30pm M-F or on weekends and holidays, please call the non-emergency number at 708-593-3830.

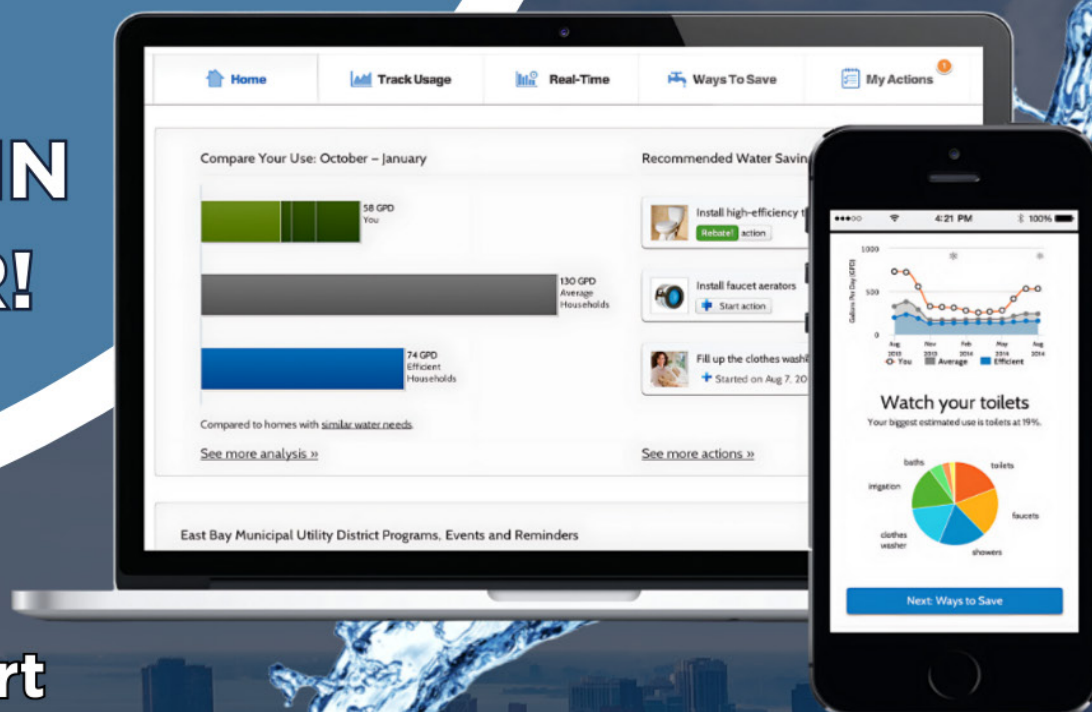

Westchester Primary School

Westchester Primary Community is dedicated to social-emotional and academic growth. During December, our students practiced "I can have self-control" and followed Dolphin Pride: Be Ready, Be Caring, Be Safe. Through our activities, our students thrive at WPS!

Additionally, all kindergarten-second-grade students revisited their goals for academic learning. Our students will demonstrate their progress through a variety of assessments, including the NWEA Math and Reading Map Assessment. When our students returned to school in January, Westchester Primary School continued gathering student growth data using other district benchmark assessments. These assessments provide our educators with the information they need to improve teaching and learning, make student-focused and data-driven decisions, and provide our families with student growth information. Students in grades one and two are tested three times each year (fall, winter, and spring), and kindergarteners are tested twice a year (winter and spring) in the areas of reading and math on NWEA MAP. All kindergarten, first, and second graders are also assessed using Fastbridge and other grade-level assessments to determine their growth from fall to winter, and then again in the spring. Our staff uses this growth and achievement data to develop targeted instructional strategies, differentiate instruction, and plan school-wide curricular improvements.

Additionally, at the end of each January, students who have been identified as English Language Learners will participate in ACCESS, the State-assessment designed to measure students' proficiency and growth in English in all four domains of language- reading, writing, listening, and speaking. This test is also designed to measure student performance with both social languages used every day and more complex academic language. Students will participate in whole-group reading, writing, and listening tests and individual speaking assessments. Information gathered from this assessment assists teachers with designing effective instruction.

In December, the Westchester Primary School kept our culture growing with winter celebrations of learning. The WPS Student Council created ornaments and decorated our Westchester Park District tree that was sponsored by the Westchester Parents & Teachers for Children (WPTC) Organization. WPS would like to thank the WPTC for sponsoring this tree as part of the Westchester Community Trim-A-Tree event. Our first graders celebrated Grinch Day with a Grinch-activity-filled day of learning on December 15th. On December 18th, first and second graders participated in Polar Express Day, a day filled with Polar Express reading, writing, and math activities. Our WPS students participated in the WPTC classroom winter parties and an all-school sing-along with songs to celebrate the diverse holidays before winter break. GROW Ecological Commission

During the coldest days of winter and warmest days of summer, our energy costs are at their highest. In 2026, as we experience higher gas and electric rates, it's a great time to take actions that will reduce our energy use while maintaining the same level of comfort in our home.

Start with no and low-cost actions like changing furnace filters and unplugging electronics, then plan for upgrades like LED lighting, heat pumps, or solar.

Low-Cost and No-Cost Fixes

Seal Air Leaks: Caulk and weatherstrip around doors, window, and gaps.

Manage Thermostat: Use a programmable or smart thermostat to adjust settings for heating/cooling.

Unplug "Vampire" Electronics: Use smart power strips for TVs, game consoles, chargers.

Optimize Appliances: Run full loads in dishwashers, clean HVAC filters, take shorter showers and lower water heater temp.

Use Curtains/Blinds: Close them in summer to block heat and open in winter to gain solar heat.

Complete a Free ComEd/Nicor Home Energy Assessment and receive Free or Low-Cost Energy Saving Products: Sign-up for your assessment at GROW's January 17th event: "Save Money and Energy this Winter".

Investments for Greater Savings

Insulation: Add insulation to attics, walls, and crawl spaces to prevent heat loss/gain.

HVAC Upgrades: Replace old systems with high-efficiency ENERGY STAR models. Consider a cold climate heat pump when it's time to replace your system.

Windows & Doors: Install double glazed or ENERGY STAR certified windows.

Lighting: Switch to LED bulbs and install dimmer switches.

Appliances: Choose ENERGY STAR certified washers, dryers, refrigerators, etc.

Water Heating: Consider heat pump water heaters or solar hot water systems.

Duct Sealing: Seal and insulate ducts, especially those in unconditioned spaces.

Air Leaks and Home Weatherization

Half of Westchester's housing stock was built by 1954, and the vast majority of all homes in town were built prior to 2000.

Homes built prior to the 1970s are more likely to have uncontrolled gaps letting outside air in due to less stringent construction standards, minimal insulation, and older, less-sealed windows/doors.

Leaks exist in all ages of homes, with newer builds being tighter but may still require enhanced ventilation and air filtration to ensure good air quality.

Air leaks reduce home comfort and waste energy. Home weatherization may save you up to 10% off your energy bills. Learn more at energystar.gov

Recipe of the Month

Ring in the new year by trying a delicious new recipe! This one is quick to prepare and great for warm comfort in the winter months.

Cauliflower Paprikash Stew

makes 4 servings

Ingredients

- 1 medium onion, 1 cup finely chopped
- 1 red or green bell pepper, 1 cup finely chopped
- 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons paprika
- ½ cup dry sherry
- ½ cup water
- mushrooms, 5 cups sliced

- salt, pinch
- 1 head cauliflower, separated into florets
- sour cream, 1 cup
- salt and ground black pepper to taste
- Egg noodles, package for 4 servings

Instructions

- 1) In a large saucepan, sauté onions and peppers in oil for 2-3 minutes.
- 2) Stir in paprika, sherry and water then cook on high heat for a minute.
- 3) Add mushrooms and salt, then cook covered on medium heat for 5 minutes.
- 4) Mix in cauliflower and simmer for 5-7 minutes until the cauliflower is tender.
- 5) Remove pan from heat and stir in sour cream.

- 6) Add salt and pepper to taste.

- 7) Serve warm over cooked egg noodles (follow instructions on package).

Important Notice Regarding the Village's Emergency Notification System - Cybersecurity Incident and Transition to New Platform

The Village of Westchester is providing an update regarding recent issues with the CodeRED emergency notification system. The Village was notified that CodeRED experienced a cybersecurity incident that affected its national alerting network.

While the incident has been contained, it resulted in service disruptions for many communities, including Westchester.

CodeRED has indicated that some user information may have been compromised, including names, addresses, email addresses, and phone numbers, as well as passwords associated with CodeRED-created accounts. Please note that accounts created through the Village's platforms did not include passwords.

However, residents who registered directly through CodeRED's website or app may have had a password associated with their profile.

The Village has requested additional clarification from Co-

the incident, but the vendor has not provided complete details. If you had a CodeRED password and reused it on other websites or services, we recommend updating those passwords as a precaution.

As part of their response to the incident, CodeRED permanently decommissioned the platform and began transitioning customers to a new product under Crisis24 Solutions.

At this time, the Village of Westchester—along with many municipalities—has instead chosen to move to an alternative emergency-notification provider. As a result, all CodeRED accounts used by Westchester residents have been deactivated.

Westchester is already in the process of onboarding with Everbridge, which offers comparable emergency communication capabilities. Staff is actively completing system setup, configuration, testing and training.

Once the platform is fully oper-

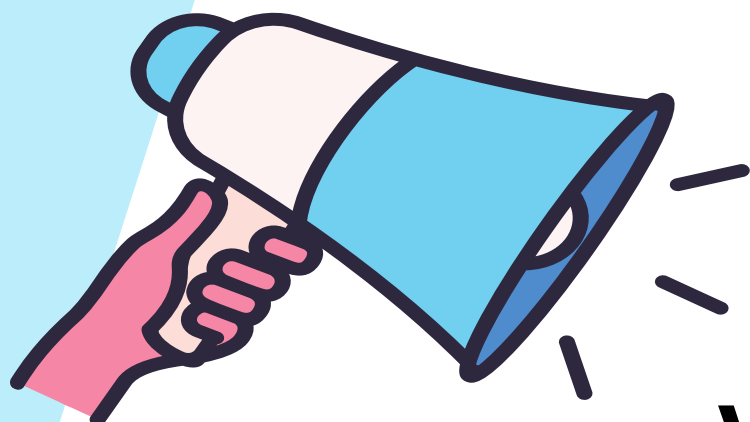

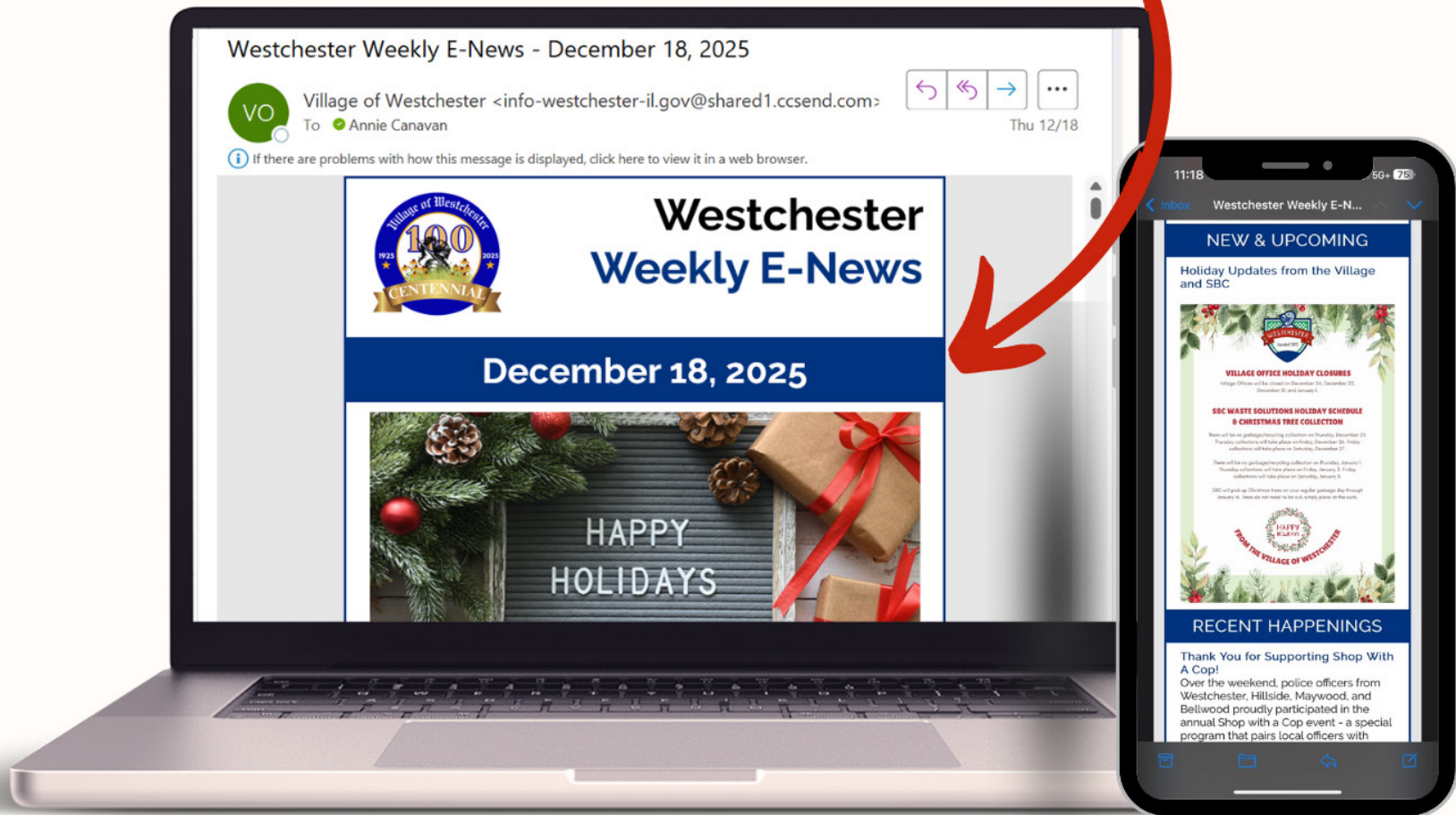
